Get your tickets now! The MSU Spartans have won the 1995 Big Ten volleyball championship with a 19-1 conference record (31-2 overall), and are heading into the NCAA playoffs.

MSU is seeded sixth in the NCAA tournament, and has been moved to the Mountain region, possibly to meet up with number three seed Hawai'i. The Spartans have a bye for the first round, and will host the second round on Saturday, December 2

at 7:00 pm in Jenison Field House. Tickets for the match will go on sale Wednesday, November 29 at 7:30 am at the Jenison Ticket Office. All seating will be general admission, but fans are strongly encouraged to purchase tickets in advance. MSU's opponent will be the winner of the Houston/BYU match held on November 29.

Assuming both MSU and Hawai'i win, MSU will probably travel to Honolulu with two other teams for the regional playoff on December 8-9, with the regional winner advancing to the Final Four. (See the accompanying article explaining the seeding, as well as the full bracket diagram.)

Season-Ending Victories

MSU closed out their home season in spectacular fashion on November 17 and 18, with back-to-back victories over national No. 8 Penn State and No. 6 Ohio State in Jenison Field House. The Ohio State match, broadcast live by Sports Channel Chicago on regional cable, was played under the Big Ten experimental live TV scoring format. The attendance for that match set a new MSU volleyball record at 4,476, and was also the largest crowd in the Big Ten this season.

MSU went on to win their last two road matches against Purdue and Northwestern on November 24 and 25 to close out the season. The big news

Sterk Named Player of the Week

Val Sterk was named NCAA Division I Player of the Week on November 20 for her performance against PSU and OSU. She hit .468 for the weekend, while averaging 5.5 kills, 3.2 digs, and 2.0 blocks per game. This was a fitting bookend to teammate Dana Cooke's Player of the Week award for MSU's road trip against these same two teams in October. The dual awards make MSU the only team in the nation to have two players honored as Player of the Week during 1995.

Big Ten Final Standings.

MSU's rise from seventh place in the Big Ten in 1994 to the conference championship in 1995 matched the biggest season-to-season turnaround in Big Ten history. In 1988, Ohio State finished seventh and then moved up to win the conference title the following year.

The top five teams in the conference were tapped to play in the NCAA tournament. All but Indiana were seeded in the top 16 nationally. Michigan and Wisconsin have been invited to play in the NIVC post-season tournament.

Wrobel Back in the Lineup

Jenna Wrobel saw action on Saturday against Northwestern, playing for the first time since suffering an ankle sprain on November 3. "She's been participating in practices, but it was important to get her some match time again before the playoffs start", said Coach Chuck Erbe. Jenna led the Spartans at Northwestern with 15 kills and 12 digs.

50/50 Raffles

Fans who attended any of the last four volleyball matches held in Jenison should have noticed the 50/50 raffle run by the SideOut Club. The Club planned to hold raffles at every home match as the major fund-raising activity for the year, but the approval process, through both MSU and the State of Michigan, took longer than expected.

Under the direction of Dave Pike, the raffles operated very smoothly and produced a net profit of almost \$1,000 for the MSU volleyball program, while making four winners very happy. Tripper's Sports Bar agreed to pay the cost of the ticket production for the last two raffles in exchange for printing Trippers' coupons on the back. Since ticket printing is the single major expense of the raffles, this arrangement will add significantly to the raffle profits.

Perhaps the highlight of the raffles occurred when the November 17th winner returned \$250 of his winnings to the Club in the form of a lifetime membership. That's the kind of winner we like!

NCAA Division I Seeding

In 1994 the NCAA Division I playoffs expanded to include 48 teams, up from 32 in previous years. As you probably know, this worked to the benefit of MSU, as the team received their first-ever invitation to post-season play. For 1995 the number of teams remains the same, but the seeding process changes significantly.

Seeding has always been controversial in volleyball, because of the historical dominance of West Coast teams. When seeding was done according to national rankings, it tended to produce an all-West-Coast Final Four tournament. A good example of this was the 1985 Final Four, when Stanford, Pacific, USC, and UCLA traveled all the way to Kalamazoo to decide the national champion.

Critics felt that national seeding hindered the growth of volleyball across the country, because the championship held little interest for those outside California. When seeding was performed geographically, it could bring Eastern and Midwest teams into the national limelight, but might result in an early exit for an otherwise outstanding West Coast team, and a less-than-competitive championship match.

Fortunately, we seem to be coming closer to national parity every year. After two years of study, the Division I Women's Volleyball Committee has put into place a new national playoff system for 1995.

The 285 schools with Division I volleyball programs are divided into eight districts (numbered I through 8), which feed into four regions—East, Central, Mountain, and Pacific. The winners of 17 athletic conferences (e.g. Big Ten, PAC-10, Big Eight) automatically get playoff bids, regardless of their national rankings. The champions from the remaining conferences (e.g. lvy League, Metro Atlantic, Patriot) participate in play-in matches to fill seven more automatic

berths. The remaining teams are selected at large, using a "power" index that reflects their win-loss records as well as the strength of their schedules.

The top four teams nationally are seeded into the four regions. If two of the top four teams are in the same region, the lower-ranked of the two is moved to a region that does not contain a top-four team. Then the fifth- through eighth-ranked teams are moved as necessary to create the I-8, 2-7, 3-6, 4-5 matchups.

The placement of districts into regions will change each year, resulting in some anomalies such as Hawai'i belonging to the Mountain region and Nebraska in the Pacific region.

1995 NCAA Playoff Brackets

Below are the complete Division I playoff brackets by region. Matches in the leftmost column are played November 29. Second-round matches (middle column) are played December 2 and 3. Within each region, the four teams that remain after the second round (indicated by the rightmost column) will play on December 7-10 to determine the four regional champions. These four will travel to Amherst MA for the Final Four tournament on December 14-16.

At Amherst, the Mountain region winner will play the Central region and the Pacific will play the East in the two semi-finals.

Numbers in parentheses indicate the top eight seeds. No. 2 seed Nebraska was moved out of the Pacific region (where they would have faced No. I Stanford) to the Central, where there was no top-four team. None of the fifth through eighth seeds was allowed to stay in its home region. No.6 seed MSU was moved to the Mountain region to create the 3-6 matchup with Hawai'i.
